HATTIE'S HISTORY CORNER by Beverly Johnson

Who Was William Craddock?



Born in 1858 to John and Caroline (Weiss) Craddock, William had three brothers: Frederick, Theophilus, and Robert. As a youth, William liked sports, and once even won the 200-yard dash in the city's first Olympiad. William, it seems was a jack-of-all-trades. After leaving home, he was first a servant and then a teamster. Later he became a blacksmith. It seems he had always had an interest in mining, and at age 23, he went to Idaho in search of gold.

When William returned home, he married Emma "Lizzie" Fehnemann, a widow with a young son. By 1891, William had purchased a home on a property with a two-stamp mill near the corner of Bedford Ave and Pleasant Street. William and Lizzie had four daughters:

Hattie, Hazel, Mabel, and Georgia. From time to time, William did other odd jobs. He worked as a handyman

for the city of Placerville, filled in for the sheriff from time to time, worked as a blacksmith on a road crew near Lake Tahoe, and helped build a foundation for a saw mill. He was also an officer in Confidence Engine Co. #1, the volunteer fire department. William participated in a number of civic groups as well, including the Fisherman's Club, a hunting group, and the Masonic Lodge.


William never lost interest in mining and as he aged, held an interest in a number of claims. The three we know the most about are the Vulture (currently the Gold Bug), the Hattie (also within Gold Bug Park), and the One to Sixteen (also in the Placerville Mining District). Records show that William had stopped mining the Vulture and Hattie sometime between 1911 and 1915. He died of heart failure in 1920.

Gold Bug Park is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a California Point of Historical Interest.

At the May 2017 board meeting, members discussed a few of the park's needs. We received a request for funds for the blacksmith shop but needed clarification, so the board will get more information from Carter. It was also called to the board's attention that the green trailer may not withstand another rainy season. Something needs to be done to ensure that its contents does not get damaged. A suggestion was made to look into the cost of a container or a shed. The board also discussed the public panning troughs. They are leaking and can no longer be repaired. The board decided to buy galvanized troughs and build a wooden shell around them. Hopefully they will be built soon.
