**Recommendation:** Recreation and Parks Commission Receive Report and provide feedback regarding specific survey questions.

**Purpose:** Present Recreation and Parks Commission with a DRAFT of survey questions for Community Survey.

**Strategic Plan Strategy**: Strategy – Expand and Improve Public Facilities and Recreation Programs.

**Background:** Following the Department Director's recommendations, the initial and most critical phase of the revision process will prioritize building authentic connections with Placerville residents to gather meaningful feedback and collect essential data. During the September meeting, it was suggested that two Commissioners meet with staff to discuss the survey questions, with the goal of creating a realistic and effective survey that captures the community's priorities and establishes a baseline for revising the Master Plan. Commissioners Pitchly and Lujan subsequently met with Director Nishihara to define the scope of focus. The Ad-Hoc Committee identified key focal points for the survey, emphasizing questions that

The Ad-Hoc Committee identified key focal points for the survey, emphasizing questions that explore residents' needs, wants, and reasons for valuing specific services. The survey's primary aim is to offer City residents a simple, accessible platform to express their priorities. The resulting data will equip the Recreation and Parks Commission with critical insights into residents' perceptions of existing department services, their essential priorities, and desired potential offerings.

It is important to note currently the Department of Community Services oversees a plethora of areas including, but not limited to recreation programs, parks, trails, facilities, creek sustainability, permitting, special events and community engagement. All aspects of the Department are pivotal components of city services. The City's General Fund supports 100% of the Department's resources totaling approximately 24% of the City's allocation.

**Discussion:** The Recreation and Parks Commission is tasked with delivering comprehensive analytical insights into the context, impacts, and underlying rationale of the following questions. This process will enhance the robustness of the associated outcomes and data, empowering staff to more effectively prioritize objectives and implement the information in operational contexts. Furthermore, the gathered data will be systematically quantified to delineate departmental priorities and formulate strategic goals.

**Subject:** Department Update

**Recommendation:** Recreation and Parks Commission to Receive Report

**Purpose:** Provide Recreation and Parks Commission with a verbal update to the status of the Community Services Department.

Strategic Plan Strategy: Informative Dialog

**Background:** The Recreation and Parks Commission regularly receives updates from staff regarding departmental activities, projects, and strategic planning efforts.

Item 1 – Parklet Use: In September, Department Staff requested recommendations as to a location to set the small parklet as its final location for use. It was suggested to present the idea to the Gold Bug Park & Mine team. However, it has been difficult to determine the best location onsite. Staff are still in the planning stages but will present a final proposed location once staff have analyzed all aspects of potential use.

Item 2 – Tree Maintenance: There were several prominent trees in the area requiring maintenance, care and resolution. Removal, treatment and care options were presented to Commission by staff in September 2025. Those areas are listed as follows;

- Mooney Parking Lot,
- Ivy Parking Lot
- The *original* Christmas Tree on Bedford Lane.
- Hangtown Creek Trees Behind County Court House off HWY 50.

Although these were not simple or inexpensive decisions, Staff resolved the following:

- Mooney Parking Lot Tree Removed
- Ivy Parking Lot Canopy lifted to provide line of site to trail eliminating unhoused loitering area and tree maintenance surrounding entire lot.
- The *original* Christmas Tree on Bedford Lane No Action Taken
- Hangtown Creek Trees Behind County Court House Removal of approx. 10 large volunteer trees obstructing the view of the street signal at Bedford and HWY 50.



COMPLETED: Mooney Parking Lot Tree has a split in two and is eroding / breaking the retaining wall.



TREATMENT IN PROCESS: Ivy Parking Lot Tree has a heavy amount of aphid and white fly infestation, causing honeydew all over pocket garden and parking stalls and sidewalk. Treatment for one cork oak tree is estimated at \$500.

Item 4 – Abatement and Maintenance: Growlersberg Crew has clear approx. <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile of creek and trail clearing starting from KFC and along the trail to Sherwin Williams. Goats were also used for weed mitigation on the Duffy Park site.

Item 5 – Community Clean Up: Successful reoccurring event was conducted on Saturday, October 18, 2025. Thank you to the Department's Maintenance Team (Todd and Luke) and to Assistant Director Lishman for his planning and coordination of the event.

Item 6 – Gold Bug Park and Mine Clean Up Day: Also on Saturday, October 18<sup>th</sup>; Recreation Coordinator Guy Easterling and his team of staff with volunteers launch new efforts to clean the park with a focus on upkeeping the stairs to the Priest Mine for revived tours.

Item 7 – Recreation Program Fees and Minimum Wage Increases (January 2026). In light of the impending minimum wage increase next year and the pressing imperative to enhance revenue for the long-term sustainability of services, staff will present a comprehensive fee assessment in preparation for potential fee adjustments in select programs. COLA is projected to be adjusted by 2.49%, raising the current wage from \$16.50 to \$16.90 starting in January. Immediate program impacts would default to Adult Softball, Aquatics, Gold Bug, Youth Basketball and possibly other services.

It is important to note (to date) no administrative costs are associated with recreational programming, whereas in many aspects only direct costs are budgeted. This is a very important aspect to consider in that the primary funding source for a multitude of the Department's services is directly funded by the City's General Fund. Staff anticipate there is a need to review the administrative cost load upon development of upcoming allocations.
